Our accounts for the year ending 31st March 2020 show income of £49,989 toward the planned camp to Georgia, again this event was cancelled due to travel restrictions and pandemic control measures therefore the accounts show an unusually high bank balance. It is hoped to hold the camp in 2021 subject to all travel and social distancing rules allowing the activity to go ahead.

Charnwood Scout District was also successful in opening a second Scout Troop within the Rothley Scout Group, allowing access to Scouting for even more young people within the district. Demand continues to increase and waiting lists are still in place throughout most of the district.

The District continues to flourish, during the past year it is encouraging that additional adults are volunteering to help and have joined us in a variety of roles all leading to the provision of a good life experience of learning, fun, adventure and enjoyment for all our young people.

As always our thanks go to all Charnwood District leaders for their time, commitment and energy they give to ensure the success of scouting within Charnwood. There is no doubt that without all the enthusiastic adult members a huge number of young people would be missing out on the adventure and fun packed activities.

Charnwood Scouts – Cubs Annual Report 2019/20

Cub packs across the District continued to be very busy and active delivering excitement and adventure. Pack programmes have demonstrated a broad range of activities, delivered with hard work, dedication and commitment by the excellent volunteers across the district

Census

There are 13 groups across the district with a total of 17 cub packs. At the time of the census we had 368 cubs which is a decrease of 13 cubs on the previous year (3.4% decrease)

District activities

Cub Splash (County) – cub packs from across the district joined other cubs from across the county for an action-packed day of wet and dry activities at the LOPC (outdoor pursuits centre). The event was over 2 days and with Charnwood being well represented over the weekend

Laser force – this proved very popular with the cubs and required making 2 bookings over 2 nights to accommodate all the cubs. Attended by over 240 cubs

District Football – always a popular event for the cubs. The games were played with great team spirit and sportsmanship with some excellent skills. Well done to East Goscote cubs who were crowned the winners

Natural History Museum (County) – This event offered a different experience for the cubs but was met with great enthusiasm. 3 coaches with almost 200 people set off for a day trip to the natural history museum where the cubs explored many different areas that history and the museum has to offer

St George virtual camp – due to the pandemic the district hosted a virtual camp for St Georges Day. This saw many cubs across the district join in with lots of fun filled activities and camp either indoors or outdoors whilst on lock down

A massive thank you to all the groups for supporting the district and county events over and above the pack programmes you all put together – your support is vital to making these activities a huge success and wouldn't be possible without you. Thank you to all the leaders and volunteers who give their time for the 'hour a week'

Charnwood international camp to Georgia (well very nearly) report 2019/2020

11 leaders and 43 scouts and explorers were getting really excited prepared for the camp and experience of their lifetime. Campers were pretty much fully paid up, flights all booked and partially paid for.

Three leaders in June 2019 had spent three nights in Georgia looking around the three sites we would be staying at. Rustavi scout campsite, the brand new river camp in the Caucus mountains and Batumi our final stop on the Black Sea. From home to Georgia and back to home was 76 hours and around 34 of those hours were spent travelling including an 8 hour taxi ride for £60 from Rustavi to Batumi after finding no evidence the night train that we intended to catch was actually running! The campsite at Rustavi was very impressive with a lot of brand new activities and fairly new accommodation, ideal for our scouts and explorers to acclimatise and get to know each other.





The new river camp in the Caucasus mountains was still being built but we were assured that it would be finished by the end of the summer well ahead of next years camp(2020). The scenery and surroundings were fantastic and gave a good flavour of Georgian life and countryside, perfect for a base to explore the area.





Back to Rustavi for the night and then an early morning start for our 8 hour taxi ride to our third camp location Batumi on the Black Sea coast. The old town and seaside area was perfect to give everyone some free time at the end of the camp with many attractions and places to visit.



Unfortunately like so many other plans this year we decided to delay our Georgian adventure until 2021 following the COVID 19 outbreak showing no signs of slowing down in time to keep everyone safe. Despite the outbreak Georgia with a population of around 4 million people only have to date under 1500 confirmed infections and less than 20 deaths mainly due to an early lockdown and a largely rural population.

Flights were cancelled with eventually a full refund.

Leader Training Report



This has been a year of considerable change with respect to training.

As a district, we have provided lots training, both for our young leaders and adult members. Below are some photos from the Programme Planning Training this year. Balloon Chairs was a definite hit with the trainees.





To support the GSLs and new leaders, the district introduced a new training booklet, with an expectation that new leaders would complete Module 1 prior to their appointment. This process never got into fruition due to Covid, but a similar process is expected to be introduced once we fully return to scouting.

In the meantime...

Despite the closure of scouting, the national training team have made numerous changes to the training programme. From September 2020, the following process will be added to POR:

Module 6 has now been incorporated into Module 1. There are separate safeguarding and safety modules to be completed, all of which will count to the initial Getting Started modules.

Exec members also must complete Module 1, safety and safeguarding, as well as a new module on being a Trustee.

The other main change has been with national chasing those leaders who are not completing their training. Getting Started should be completed within 5 months of an appointment. A wood badge must be completed within 3 years. The District Commissioner can in exceptional circumstances extend these times by a month, but they can apply conditions during this extension period.

Emails from Gilwell have been sent suspending leaders who are not compliant with their training this will continue. Unbelievably, nationally, on average 20% of leaders are not compliant, Charnwood as a district has an average of 1.5%, so well done everyone and a special thank you to all the GSLs and Training Advisors that have supported adult members and me along the way. Compared to other districts, Charnwood's training picture is well on track, so we should be proud of ourselves.

Finally, several of the district team and GSLs have completed their Risk Assessment training ready for the re-opening of scouting. Bear with us as we steer through these challenging times, as ever, we are here to support you through the process.

As we return to scouting, stay safe and continue the good work.

Dear all, I have great pleasure in reporting back to you on what has been another fantastic and busy year again at the Oaks with many young people experiencing the activities and the fabulous setting and facilities we have here.

Head Warden Search

We are still in the process of searching for a Head Warden. 2019 was led by members of The Oaks Management Team who shared the role and responsibilities normally attributed to the Head Warden.

What has been happening over 2019?

• Working with the Woodland Trust – We have had some great collaborative sessions with our neighbours who look after the Clarkes old residence – With some good meetings we have managed to secure our rightful access to the top road which the trust had closed. Our staff was invited to spend a few hours one evening to visit the old house and to learn about the great work undertaken by the Woodland Trust.

• Improvements to the Clarke Hut – we now have a wonderful new floor in the Clarke hut improving the facilities and comfort for our young people. We also took advantage of the flooring contractors who kindly helped with new carpet tiles in our staff service room.

- Our wardens with the help of Charnwood Explorers painted and decorated the Staff Room.
- We have improved and upgraded some of our key activities Archery & Climbing

• We have also with the help of the Explorers replaced our site field entrance with a brilliant new entrance displaying the hand made Acorns from our groups

• We had a difficult year with the weather with damage to our access road – fortunately with the help of our neighbour Keith Cook we will have the road back to normal again.

• Loughborough University Scouts and Guides Club – Scogui - Scogui attended on a number of weekends and focussed their attention on our Jungle Trail. They did an amazing job helping to improve and repair some of the activities and they also left a legacy by creating their own activity which now features within the trail.

• We have completed the pathway between the toilet block and the site office – the old slabs have been replaced with a new concrete floor removing all the trip hazards.

• Prit Kitching has done an amazing job with the shop and has introduced a reduced sugar range of treats along with some great new branded gifts.

• We featured on BBC Radio Leicester's treasure hunt

• We have been looking after our ancient woodland – clearing down holly, ditching and we have trained up a couple of our members of staff in the skill of dry stonewalling.

Oaks Staff - Without the help and the dedication of the Oaks Staff who give up their free time as volunteers many young people around the county and further afield would not get the opportunity to experience this wonderful site in the heart of Leicestershire. Our staff and helpers play a massive role in Scouting and their help and dedication will have a lasting impression on all the youngsters who enjoy taking part in the activities we have to offer here at the Oaks.

Camper Nights

We had a decline on the number of camper nights compared to 2018, despite lowering the camper fee's for our districts and offering evening / day visitor for free, we have not improved on the numbers compared to previous years. We have taken in consideration that many groups were attending Charnwood 2019 which tends to impact on our figures.
